MCKINNEY-VENTO HOMELESS EDUCATION PROGRAM



McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act requires that children and youth experiencing homelessness have equal access to the same free, appropriate public education, including a public preschool education, as provided to other children and youth. To ensure access to educational and other services necessary to meet the same challenging State academic standards to which all students are held, State educational agencies and local educational agencies are required to develop, review, and revise policies and procedures to remove barriers to the identification, enrollment, attendance, and academic success of children and youth experiencing homelessness (42 U.S.C. §§11431-11432).



- · Immediate enrollment without documents.
- · School stability.
- · Transportation to school of origin.
- Eliminate barriers = ensure school policies and procedures are fair.
- · Unaccompanied youth=immediate enrollment.
- · No judgment = communicate with sensitivity and understanding.
- · No discrimination = create a safe, confidential environment.
- · Resource referrals.
- · Address the social-emotional needs.
- · District liaison assigned to every school district.
- · Dispute resolution process.
- · Receive ongoing support the ADE homeless education program.

Key Provisions of the McKinney-Vento Act

McKinney-Vento Definition of Homeless

Those who lack a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence, including students:

- Sharing housing due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason
- Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, camping grounds due to a lack of alternative, adequate accommodation
- Living in emergency & transitional shelters
- Abandoned in hospitals

- Living in public or private places not designed for or ordinarily used as regular sleeping accommodations for human beings
- Living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, bus or train stations or similar situations
- Migratory children living in the above situations

42 U.S.C. § 11434a(2)

Fixed, Regular, and Adequate



What exactly is a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence?

Fixed

Stationary, permanent, not subject to change.

Regular

Used on a predictable, routine, consistent basis.

Consider the relative permanence.

Adequate


Lawfully and reasonably sufficient.

Sufficient for meeting the physical and psychological needs typically met in a home environment.

Can the student go to the SAME PLACE (fixed) EVERY NIGHT (regular) to sleep in a SAFE AND SUFFICIENT SPACE (adequate)?

- ☐ The term *unaccompanied youth* includes a homeless child or youth not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian. *42 U.S.C. § 11434a(6)*
- ☐ An unaccompanied homeless youth is a young person who is both homeless (meeting McKinney-Vento definition) and unaccompanied (not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian).
- ☐ Liaison must assist UHY with enrollment, school selection, & dispute resolution
- ☐ Have the same right to immediate enrollment & educational services as other students

Unaccompanied Homeless Youth





Definition: child or youth who meets the McKinney-Vento definition and is not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian. 11434a(6)

- · Many youth become separated from parents due to lack of space in living situations or shelter policies.
- · Many flee abuse: 20-50% sexual; 40-60% physical.
- · Many flee family dysfunction: Over 2/3 Hotline callers report at least one parent abuses drugs or alcohol.
 - Roughly 1/3 homeless youth identify as LGBTQ.
- · 10% of currently homeless female teens are pregnant.
- · Many are not enrolled in school.

Unaccompanied Homeless Youth

Barriers to Education for Homeless Children and Unaccompanied Youth



- o Stereotypes and lack of awareness.
- o Under-identification.
- o High mobility resulting in lack of school stability and educational continuity.
- o Enrollment requirements (school records, health records, proof of residence, guardianship).
- o Poor health, fatigue, hunger.
- o Emotional trauma, depression, anxiety.
- o Lack of transportation.
- o Lack of school supplies, clothing, etc.

Impacts of Homelessness on Children and Unaccompanied Youth

- o Higher incidences of acute and chronic illnesses, depression and anxiety.
- o Homelessness in early childhood is associated with poor classroom engagement and poor social skills in early elementary school.
- o The achievement gaps between homeless and low-income elementary students tend to persist, and may even worsen, over time.
- o A youth who experiences homelessness is 87% more likely to drop out of school.

McKinney-Vento Student Eligibility Questionnaire

Questionaries are part of the new and returning student enrollment packets.

- If question on temporary living arrangement is answered "yes," and the address listed on the SEQ is within the school boundaries enroll the student immediately and send SEQ form to McKinney-Vento Liaison.
- The McKinney-Vento Liaison will follow up with the parent, guardian, caregiver, or student to conduct an interview. The school site will receive a notification to confirm the eligibility decision.
